Bond Program Enters Final Lap

By the end of 2022, 23 bond-funded projects are built, all across town. 12 more projects are underway, and all of those are planned to be complete in the next year. Looking ahead to 2023, we expect this will become known as the Year of Construction.

For some of the final projects, there has been years of work behind the scenes. Now, we're finally ready to pour concrete. It's a bit like bamboo: a forest grows overnight after years of planning, planting, cultivating and watering.

Meanwhile, Tualatin's strategic investments in the transportation system have already resulted in notable progress on all three bond program priorities: neighborhood traffic safety, congestion relief, and safe access to schools and parks.

Our Chief of Police Greg Pickering says: "The focus on walkability and livability is commendable. The new sidewalks, flashing lights and driver feedback signs have made a big difference."

Although the five-year bond program will be wrapping up in 2023, the City will still be asking residents and businesses to identify future transportation system needs. Go to www.tualatinoregon.gov/ntsp



Our Chief of Police Applauds TMF Program Safety Benefits

Tualatin Police Chief Greg Pickering has become a fan of Tualatin Moving Forward. Reviewing the results of traffic safety improvements around our neighborhoods, the Chief notes the new mid-block crosswalks with pedestrianactivated flashing beacons, driver feedback signs and buffered bike lanes are making a real difference.

Chief Pickering says the newly enhanced school crossings are the most important improvements. These include a crosswalk on Boones Ferry Road near Tualatin High School, and two more near Tualatin Elementary School at the

intersections of 95th Avenue / Avery Street and Sagert Street.

Another priority was the crosswalk and signal at Boones Ferry Road and Siletz Drive, an intersection where pedestrians have been injured. "Those crosswalks have been extremely helpful."

Police Department safety records confirm the new crosswalks and signals are highly effective. In local enforcement sweeps funded by state grants, violations are rare: "Drivers are actually stopping for the flashing lights," reports the Chief.

Martinazzi Ave/Sagert St Project Ignites Social Media Response

Construction wrapped up in March on improvements to the busy intersection of Martinazzi Avenue and Sagert Street. Designed to address traffic congestion, the project installed new traffic signals to replace the 4-way stop signs. Additional improvements include high-visibility crosswalks, curb ramps and new sidewalks that connect to all four corners of the intersection. Bike lanes have been reconfigured, too, and access improved to the public transit stops.

The Martinazzi/Sagert improvements made it the City's most popular project on social media. Here's a sample of the comments.

Signature Project – 95th Ave and Avery St (Tualatin Elementary School)

This signature project was identified in response to concerns about pedestrian safety expressed by area residents. The location next to Tualatin Elementary School offered an opportunity to improve safety for children walking and biking to school.

The project was designed in response to extensive interaction over 3+ years with school staff, parents, students and project neighbors. Three community surveys conducted in 2020-2021 drew over 200 responses. Survey participants voiced their hopes and concerns:

"I would love to see speed bumps! People FLY down our street. I'd also love to see the sidewalk redone and finished on both sides of the north side of 93rd. Kids have to walk in the street."

"Sidewalks along the entire road and speed humps would help us feel more comfortable as parents who enjoy walking and riding bikes with our kids."

The project design called for installing crosswalks with pedestrian-activated flashing beacons. The intersections at 95th and 93rd Avenues were upgraded, with better signage and traffic controls. New sidewalks along 93rd Avenue improved

walkability. Parents and neighbors were pleased with the results.



Good News for Tualatin's Busiest Intersection

One key project for 2023 tackles Tualatin's busiest intersection – at the junction of Tualatin-Sherwood Rd/Nyberg St and I-5. Computer modeling revealed the best solution. Instead of reconfiguring the intersection, the modeling indicated that restriping the existing lanes and adjusting the signage will yield significant time savings. Together with extending the third eastbound lane to the west, this will result in better balancing of traffic across all lanes.

Travel time from Boones Ferry to I-5 will be:

The time savings will benefit every resident and business in Tualatin – all of us. The design offers a practical solution. It's not only more effective at managing traffic, but also takes less time to construct, saves money and avoids impacts to private property.
